

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EAST PETE'S PAST

1710-1720

The first settlers began to arrive in Lancaster County. No one, however, had ventured North into the East Petersburg (E.P.) area.

1730

Andrew Hershey was one of the first settlers in the E.P. area. Official recordings of land transactions began around 1730 in Lancaster County. Andrew Hershey was officially given 500 acres of land to the west of town to begin homesteading and developing the area.

1750

There were still no roads or houses present in the E.P. area. There were only small, irregular paths which generally followed former Indian trails.

PRE-1800

The first church and school were held in the cider house owned by Mr. Hershey. Other facilities were not yet established.

1800


One of the first teachers in the E.P. area was George Streng, who was noted for his German teachings. He made many notable contributions to the historical preservation of this period.

1806

Two main roads were established. North and South – Lancaster to Manheim. East and West – Columbia to Huber's Corner. These roads accommodated wagon travelers. Daniel Wolfe bought 25 acres from his brother, John, at the intersection of these two routes because of the increase in travel, and the hope of profit in land speculation.

FEATURED ARTIFACT

his is "Fishing Lamp" or "Lantern." The body would hold "coal oil" (kerosene). The (3) spouts would each have a cotton rope that wicked up the coal oil. The wicks would be lit. The lamp would be placed on the bank of the lake or creek, serving as a light for the fisherman. Some claim the lantern also attracted the fish.



COOKING UP THE PAST

PEPPERMINT EGG CUSTARD PIE

A popular Easter season dish during the19th century.

Ingredients: 1/2 cup sugar 4 eggs 1/4 of a nutmeg freshly ground 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour 2 cups whole milk 3 - 4 large sprigs of peppermint

Tear the mint leaves into small pieces. Spread them on the bottom of a 9" pastry-lined pie dish. Sprinkle the nutmeg on top of the mint. Mix the flour and the sugar. Beat in the eggs. Add the milk and mix well. Pour over the mint & nutmeg. Bake at 375°F for about 35 to 40 minutes.
